
Looking for JJ Anne Cassidy

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




This is the first book in the Seeing Stones trilogy, the others being Arthur at the Crossing Places and Arthur King of the Middle March


An honest portrayal of what it is like to grow up in today's judgemental world.

Stunning novel about a warped alternative universe hidden behind a door. Very weird and altogether creepy. If you weren't scared by the film, you will be when you read the book!



Samkad's absorbing journey to manhood is intensified when a white stranger arrives in his village claiming to be his brother, a stranger who tells tales of a people called Americans. Then, when the Americans arrive, bringing war and destruction to the Bontok's remote mountains, nothing will be the same again. Not for Samkad, nor for his family and culture.

A historically enlightening and emotionally powerful, tale, this coming-of-age adventure is full of atmosphere and action.



The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night Time Mark Haddon 'Lots of things are mysteries. But that doesn't mean there isn't an answer to them' and when Christopher finds a dead dog on his neighbour's lawn he applies the principles he has learnt from Sherlock Holmes, his own literary hero to solve the crime. In particular, Christopher traces the mystery surrounding his mother's absence and his father's unexpected behaviour, drawing on the clues he can understand. It is also a story without lies because Christopher can't tell lies. Christopher does not like strangers or the colours yellow or brown or being touched. On the other hand, he knows all the countries in the world and their capital cities and every prime number up to 7507.

This is Christopher's unique murder mystery story. It is also make his very special journey of discovery.




Goodnight Mister Tom

Chinese Cinderella Adeline Yen Mah A heart breaking and heart warming story of a special friendship that grows between Willie Beech, evacuated to the country to avoid the Blitz on London, and Tom Oakley, the reserved old man who begrudgingly takes him in. Willie has been lonely and neglected all his life as his mother lacks the ability to care for him. Under Mister Tom's patient and kind guidance Willie grows emotionally and physically to become the boy he should have been. He blossoms at school and makes several friends for the first time in his life. But then his mother wants him back home in London. Must Willie lose everything that has made him happy?

Jung-ling's family considers her bad luck because her mother died giving birth to her. They discriminate against her and make her feel unwanted yet she yearns and continuously strives for her parents' love. Her stepmother is vindictive and cruel and her father dismissive. Jung-ling grows up to be an academic child, with a natural ability for writing. Only her aunt and grandfather offer her any love and kindness.


The story, based on Adeline Yen Mah's own life is of survival in the light of the mental and physical cruelty of her stepmother and the disloyalty of her siblings. Jung-ling blossoms in spite of everything and the story ends as her father agrees to let her study in England.


Ways to Live Forever Sally Nicholls


Animal Farm



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

The Hobbit J.R.R. Tolkien Heartbreaking and funny in equal measure, 10-year-old Jamie's direct and wide-eyed account of the emotional chaos he and his family live through following the death of his sister in a terrorist attack is poignant and warm-hearted. Beginning a new life in the Lake District with his older sister and his father, who mourns his daughter through alcohol and a wild rage against her killers, Jamie knows he should feel sadder than he does. The truth is, he can hardly remember his sister; and what is happening with his new school and new friends, especially Sunya, is more urgent – as is his yearning for his absent mother.

Emotionally charged, this is a wonderfully touching story.

Three witches – Granny Weatherwax, Nanny Ogg and Magrat Garlick – have gathered on a lonely heath. A king has been cruelly murdered, his throne usurped by his ambitious cousin. An infant heir and the crown of the kingdom, both missing...

Witches don't have these kinds of dynastic problems themselves – in fact, they don't have leaders. Granny Weatherwax is the most highly regarded of these non-existent leaders. But even she is about to find that meddling in royal politics is a lot more complicated than certain playwrights would have you believe...

Wyrd Sisters is the sixth Discworld novel but they can be read in any order.

In a hole in the ground there lived a hobbit. Not a nasty, dirty, wet hole, filled with the ends of worms and an oozy smell, nor yet a dry, bare, sandy hole with nothing in it to sit down on or to eat: it was a hobbit-hole, and that means comfort. Written for J.R.R. Tolkien's own children, The Hobbit met with instant critical acclaim when it was first published in 1937. Now recognized as a timeless classic, this introduction to the hobbit Bilbo Baggins, the wizard Gandalf, Gollum, and the spectacular world of Middle-earth is unforgettable.

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
