SMSC - Provides students with the opportunity to consider lives that are different to their own, how their own choices can impact on themselves and others and explore real life moral issues, including resilience and eating disorders, racism, gangs and organised crime and role

CEIAG - Students continue to build on their understanding of the world of work with a focus on careers in STEM/ NHS, local job markets, stereotyping in careers, KS4 options, exploring careers utilising Unifrog. Students also take part in writing a mock application form for employment and having a mock interview from external employers during our 'interview days'.

Enrichment - Students have the opportunity to take part in a talk led by Leicestershire Police surrounding gangs and knife crime, alongside a session lead by WizeUp Financial education during their Finance skills unit. Some students also have the opportunity to go on a day visit to the Houses of Parliament, allowing a greater understanding of democracy in British society.

Enrichment - Students have the opportunity to take part in a workshop/ talk lead by the Warning Zone, aiming to improve knowledge of online safety, alongside a session on county lines led by Leicestershire Police. CEIAG – Students complete their applications for further education, mainly through the PS16 system. Support is given for writing personal statements, interview technique and networking. This is delivered through form tutors, Unifrog and local employers.

SMSC- This is a strand which runs through most units in Citizenship, but moral issues are particularly important in the RSE unit. Cultural awareness is also vital when studying honour based abuse. We also study ethics and connect them to religious views on key issues such as capital punishment and assisted dying.

British Values– Mutual respect is especially important in Year 11 when students study relationships. Tolerance is also key when studying different religions and cultures during the Autumn term.

Enrichment— Students receive a practice interview from two local employers/ members of the community. They also have a presentation from WizeUp Education about finance skills.

CEIAG—Towards the end of Year 10 students start preparing applications for post 16 study, with particular emphasis on CV writing and personal statements. They also receive numerous visits from external employers and providers in addition to a bi—annual careers fair

SMSC- This is a strand which runs through most units in Citizenship, but the moral component is particularly important when studying social media, migration and human rights case studies. We also study world religions, their celebrations and the connections with out local community.

British Values— The politics unit covers the importance of democracy in the UK. This is in addition to a focus on individual rights and the rule of law in

the Amnesty International and Human Rights units.

Enrichment– Year 10 students receive two lessons on RE as part of enrichment days in addition to Humanutopia, which focusses on mental resilience and respecting others.
